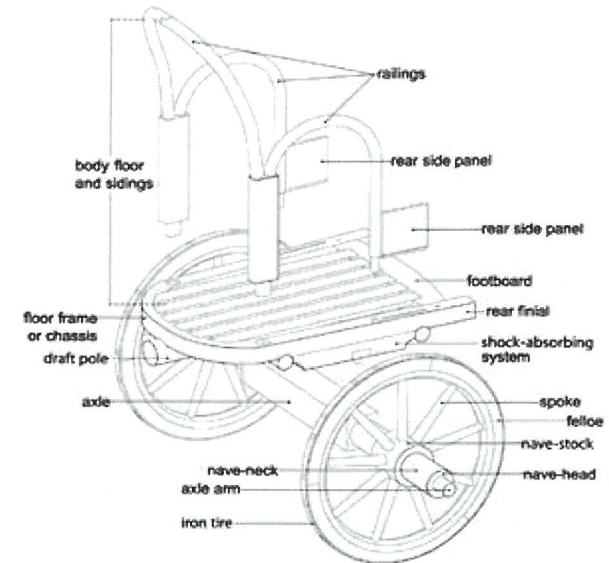

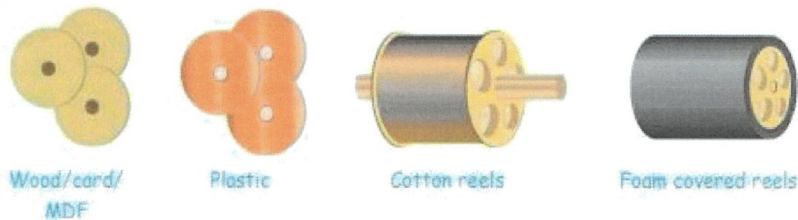

Knowledge Organiser - Wheels and Axles - Design Technology

Key Vocabulary:	
Wheels	A circular object that revolves on an axle and is fixed below a vehicle or other object to enable it to move easily over the ground .
Axle	A rod that enables a wheel to rotate. The wheel can rotate freely on the axle or be fixed to, and turn with, the axle.
Moving Vehicle	A thing used for transporting people or goods, especially on land, such as a car, lorry or cart.
Axle holder	The component through which an axle fits and rotates.
Chassis	The frame or base on which a vehicle is built.
Mechanism	System of parts working together in a machine; a piece of machinery



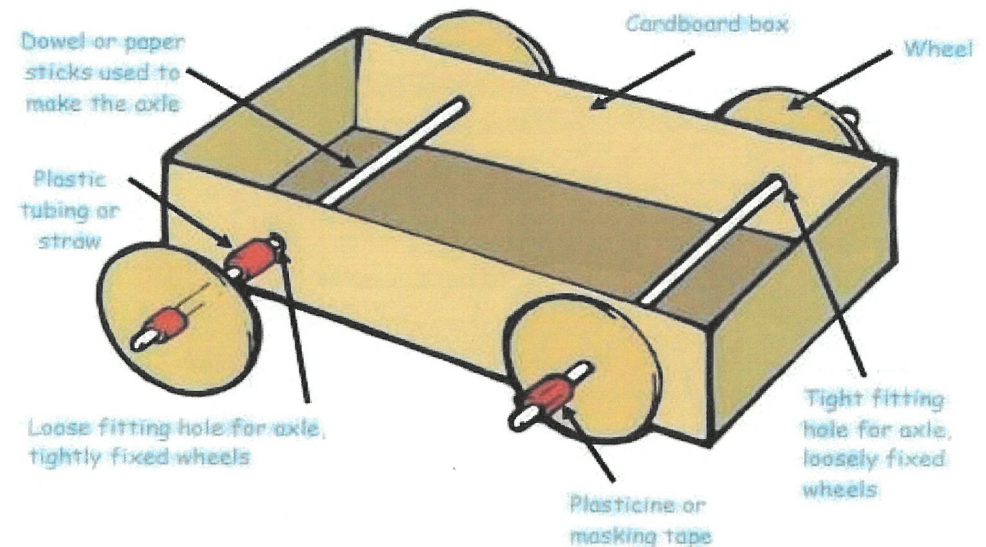
Types of Wheels:



Moving Vehicles:



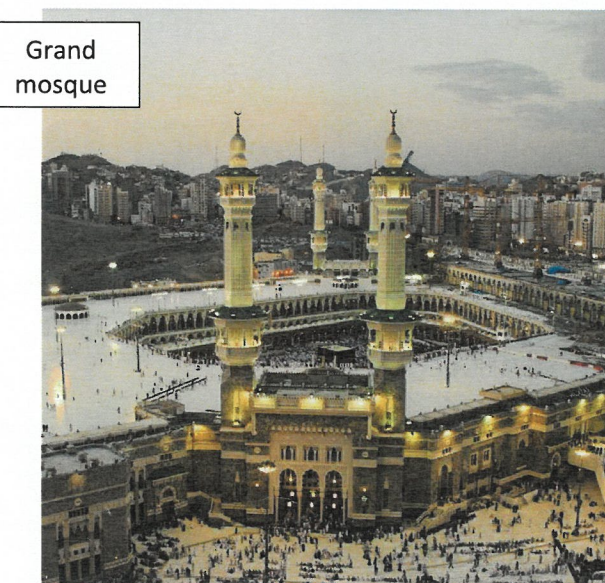
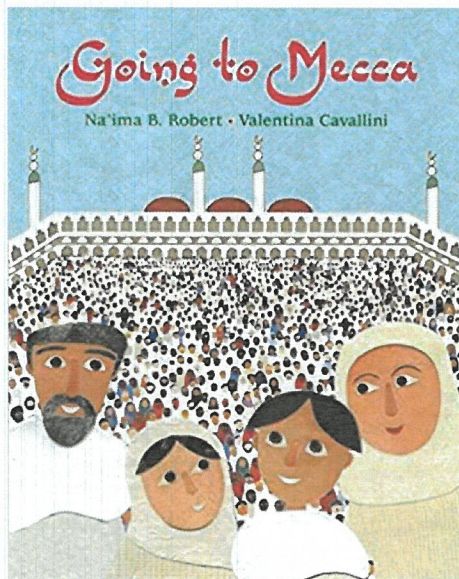
Examples of two different ways to fix wheels:

pilgrimage	A journey to a sacred place
Ka'bah	The Ka'bah is a cube-shaped black box. It marks the centre of the Muslim world

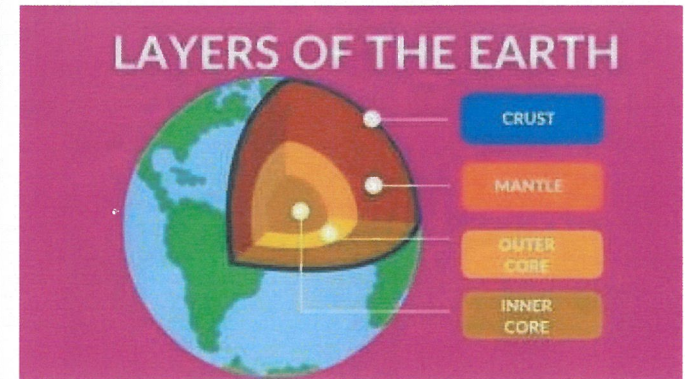

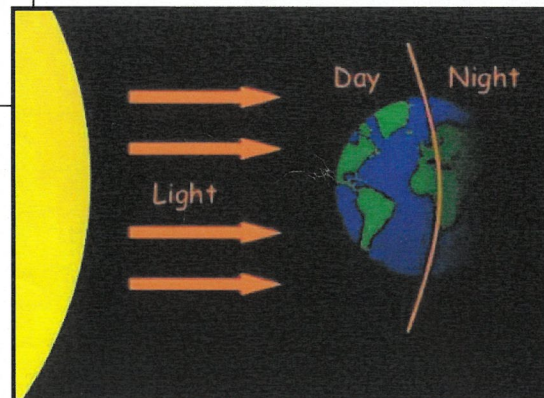
Key Vocabulary	Definition
Solar System	The Sun, the eight planets, their moons, and other smaller objects together make our Solar System.
Orbit	The path of an object around another, orbits usually follow a circular shaped path. The Earth orbits the Sun.
Rotate	Turning around an axis.
Waxing	When the moon appears to be getting larger, because we can see more of it.
Waning	When the moon appears to be getting smaller, because we can see less of it.
Constellation	A group of stars that form a pattern or picture that people have told stories about.
Volcano	A mountain with an opening that allows molten rock and ash to escape through from below the surface of the earth.
Crust	The outside of the Earth, we live on the crust.
Mantle	Under the crust is the mantle, this layer of the earth is partly solid and partly liquid.
Core	The centre of the earth, the core is extremely hot.



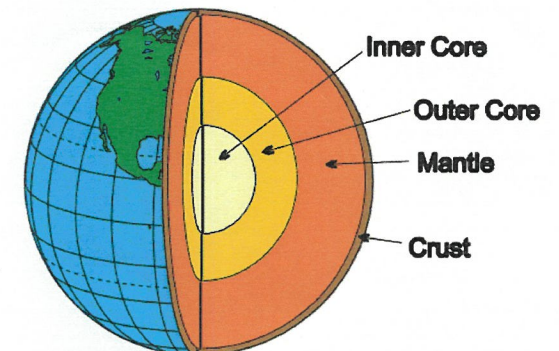

Boycott	When people refuse to buy, use, or go somewhere in protest to bring about change
Activist	A person who feels passionately about something and wants to make a change
Civil Rights	The rights that belong to every person. The American Civil Rights Movement that fought for equal rights for black people.
Campaign	Planned actions to achieve a goal
Climate Change	The process of our planet heating up.

Worry	To keep thinking about unpleasant things that might happen or about problems that you have.

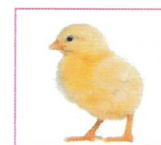


Key Knowledge

Music Knowledge Organiser – Unit 6: The Power of Communication

Key Vocabulary	
Pitch	How high or low a sound is (like a tiny bird vs. a dinosaur!).
Dynamics	How loud or soft the music is.
Tempo	The speed of the music (fast, slow, or somewhere in between).
Timbre	The “sound colour” of a voice. Rapping is a different timbre from singing
Beat / Pulse	The steady heartbeat of the music.
Structure	The way a song is constructed, verse and chorus. The chorus is the same each time, but the verses have different words.
Ensemble	A group performing music together (singers, instruments, or both).
Rhythm	The pattern of long and short sounds that sits on top of the pulse.
